Thank you for your continued support as we worked tirelessly to support our teen families as they overcame challenges to achieve new educational levels and establish healthy families. We faced the challenges of high turnover, the rising costs of program services, and continuing to provide quality services to our teen families. Despite all of the obstacles we faced, we watched 27 DAPI Daughters receive their high school diplomas this year. We heard countless words of encouragement from individuals who wished our DAPI Daughters all of the best. This year, we celebrated Amira Dennis as she received a full scholarship to Delaware State University and will matriculate as a traditional, oncampus student. This is the first in many years for one of our DAPI Daughters to obtain this experience.

We, again, received the support of the Delaware Department of Public Health and their partner, Health Management Associates (HMA), to implement programming in many schools. We are appreciative of their continued partnership. The Family Connection (FamCo) is offered to communities and schools throughout the state through this funding.

Mentoring is an important part of the program service provided to our DAPI Daughters. This fiscal year, we were fortunate to receive a grant from the Delaware Department of Volunteerism – AmeriCorps. We received three AmeriCorps Members that were placed within each DAPI location. The AmeriCorps Members serve as Mentor Coordinators. We are still looking for more. 



Financial Position

For the year ended June 30, 2023, DAPI realized a net gain of \$150,123. Overall expenses increased by \$266,920 from the prior fiscal year as DAPI continued its efforts to manage expenses while providing quality services.


The organization raised an increase of \$266,595 from the prior year (which included PPP money in the total). The DPH-Healthy Women Healthy Baby grant and the State of Delaware Grant in Aid provided help to DAPI during the fiscal year, which ensured that the needs of young families were met without financial challenges.








Total Number of Traditional Students: 66


Statewide English Grades




Statewide Math Grades

Academic Program

The 2022-2023 school year presented DAPI with a few challenges. The effects of the pandemic, the lack of a math instructor in all locations, and attendance challenges for the students are just some of what the DAPI team had to face. However, despite these challenges, DAPI continued to be flexible and found unique and creative ways to solve any problems that came their way.

When reviewing the overall data from the 2022-2023 school year, there was a larger percentage of students earning a 3.1 or better GPA in the 2nd semester. Another interesting fact is that a larger percentage of girls earned a 3.1 or higher GPA as their cumulative GPA. This is attributed to many of our girls not being as successful at their homeschools and entering DAPI with low GPAs. Many of the students found our smaller setting more successful and thus improved their overall GPAs at the end of the school year. There were 2 girls who earned a 4.0 in mid-year and three ladies at the end of the school year who earned a 4.0. A student from the Sussex County Center earned a 4.0 at both the mid-year and end of the year.

The following represents the GPAs found in the Centers:

During the 2022-2023 school year, we made some significant changes that affected instruction as well as how we assessed our students. These changes are as follows...

- Eliminated midterms and focused on project-based assignments; Teachers received additional professional development to implement the change.
- A uniform number of assignments for each subject to improve the grading system
- Implemented standardized, computer-adaptive assessments for Reading and Math.

During the 2022-2023 academic year, we held our first **Financial Empowerment - DAPI Daughter Day**. The day focused on Math skills for everyday living. We had professionals from auto dealerships, real estate agencies, banking, and some that are entrepreneurs. The topics included how to save and buy a car or a home, how to open different types of banking accounts, and students received advice from independent business owners.







The Sussex Center Director, Kim Wright, recognized that there was a population of students that had been underserved in the past. These girls spoke very little to no English, but instead were fluent in Spanish. Center Director Wright hired a recent DAPI Daughter graduate through a partnering program. Together they developed a service that allowed the girls to be accepted and properly supported. An additional supplemental online program, specifically for students who are not English speakers, was purchased. Additional classes were developed as well as support for the girls as they transitioned into general education courses. The program that was developed not only assisted the girls academically, but also fostered a sense of community, collaboration, and friendship.










Student Ethnicity






